EXPLORE THE AREA MARKED ON THE MAP TO FIND THE ANSWER TO EACH QUESTION. THEN USE YOUR ANSWERS TO SOLVE THE MYSTERY PHRASE.



1 Start at the Convict Lumber Yard. This was one of the earliest sites of convict industry in Australia. Convict labour was used to cut down and transport red cedar logs before they were cut into planks and stored here. Find Trevor Weeke's sculpture called Making an Impression. What symbol can you see on the sculpture?

2 Above Foreshore Park, you'll spot stairs leading down. They are named after a local who founded the Newcastle East Residents group that campaigned extensively for the preservation of Newcastle East End. What is the name of the stairs?

3 In front of the historic tramsheds in Foreshore Park, you'll come across a circular collection of bronze legs called Evolution 2. How many legs are there?

4 Search within the legs until you find a square plaque. What is buried in this area and is due to be opened on 26 January 2052?

5 Head over to the playground at Foreshore Park. One of the pieces of play equipment resembles a mode of transport. What is it?

6 Look for the white sculpture near the pond at Foreshore Park. What word is written under the sculpture?

7 Cross the bridge and head towards the harbour. Find a stone block with a plaque on it and read the inscription. In October 2001, a crowd of 80,000 came to Foreshore Park to celebrate the victory of what NRL team.

8 On the corner of Wharf Road and Horseshoe Beach, you'll spot the Newcastle Pilot Station. Find the plaque with information about the Lifeboat Service. This location was the final site of the Newcastle Lifeboat Services. The service carried out more rescues than any other in Australia. What was the name of the lifeboat that they used for most rescues?

9 Find the anchor in Camp Shortland. Behind this, you'll see a wall. The wall was erected by Newcastle City Council to commemorate the discovery of a river by Lieutenant James Shortland. What is the name of the river?

10 Find the red sculpture Grounded past the Nobbys SLSC. This art piece represents the coal ship which ran aground during wild weather in June 2007. It spent 25 days on Nobbys Beach before it was successfully refloated. What is the name of the ship?
